Irish at the Battle of Fredericksburg

The Irish Brigade under General Thomas F. Meagher suffered its most severe casualties in December at the Battle of Fredericksburg where its fighting force was reduced from over 1600 to 256. The brigade was involved in the northern battleground at Fredericksburg, where they assaulted the sunken road in front of Marye's Heights. Ironically, one of the regiments manning the sunken road defenses was a predominantly Irish Regiment commanded by General Thomas Reade Rootes Cobb. Knowing that Cobb's men manned the wall, and that both Cobb's and Meagher's units contained members of the Irish Republican Brotherhood, an organization dedicated to gaining military experience in the United States then freeing Ireland from Britain after the Civil War, Lee ordered reserves sent to the position. He need not have worried.



Cobb's men helped decimate the Irish Brigade before the reinforcements could settle in place. It was at Fredericksburg that Lee allegedly referred to Meagher's regiment as the "Fighting 69th".

Sgt. Richard Kirkland - The Angel of Marye's Heights



No longer able to withstand the wrenching moans of the suffering wounded and dying Union soldiers, 19-year-old Confederate Sergeant Richard Kirkland of the 2nd South Carolina approached Brigadier General Joseph Kershaw, CSA, seeking permission to go to their aid. Initially hesitant, the General acquiesced, refusing however to allow the white flag that would ensure his safety. Despite the danger, Kirkland sprang forward over the stone wall with canteens full and ventured out between the hostile lines. At first, Federals fired upon the young man but ceased as they soon discovered his merciful intent. Then cheers rang out from both sides as the man to become known as


the "Angel of Marye's Heights" offered water to one adversary after another. After helping those that he could, he crossed back to the safety of his lines, and resumed his duties as a Confederate soldier defending those lines.



In September of 1863, Sergeant Kirkland would find himself fighting in the western theater as a detachment from Lieutenant General Longstreet's Corps moved west to support General Braxton Bragg's efforts to stop Union Major General William Starke Rosecrans and the Army of the Cumberland. They would do just that during the Battle of Chickamauga which would produce both a Southern victory and 34,600 casualties. Sadly, the valiant Sergeant ranked among those killed during this colossal battle. Mortally wounded in a failed charge, Kirkland exhorted his comrades to, "Save yourselves" adding "Tell Pa, I died right".



Saint Brendan



Patron of boatmen, sailors, travelers, and whales

St. Brendan (486?–578?) Also known as St. Brendan the Voyager, St.

Brendan the Navigator, and St. Brandon
Born near Tralee in County Kerry, Brendan
spent his childhood in the care of St. Ita at
Killeedy, continued his studies under a
number of other Irish saints, and was
ordained a priest in 512. From an early age,
Brendan was a great traveler, establishing a
number of monasteries in Ireland, of which
the most famous was Clonfert, founded
about 560. Brendan also reputedly journeyed

to Scotland, Wales, and Brittany, furthering the spread of Christianity to these areas.

But Brendan's fame as a traveler really rests on The Voyage of St. Brendan, a tale popularized during the Middle Ages. According to this account, Brendan and a company of monks set sail on a fantastic journey in search of a fabled paradise. Along the way they visited a number of islands in the Atlantic ' one of which turned out to be the back of a whale! ' and possibly even reached the Americas. Although there is no historical proof of this journey, an expedition organized in the mid-1970s demonstrated that it was possible for the monks to have sailed a coracle of wood and leather that far. Whether or not the monks reached the New World centuries before Columbus will probably never be known.
