### St. Finian

Feastday: September 10, 579

Irish abbot, a disciple of Sts. Colman and Mochae also called Winin. He was born in Strangford, Lough, Ulster, in Ireland, a member of a royal family. Studying under Sts. Colman and Mochae, he became a monk in Strathclyde and was ordained in Rome. Returning to Ulster, Finian founded several monasteries, becoming abbot of Moville, in County Down, Ireland. He became embroiled with St. Columba, a student, over a copy of St. Jerome s Psalter, and St. Columba had to surrender that copy to Finian. He also founded Holywood and

Dumfries in Scotland. Finian was known for miracles, including moving a river.

# Symbols of Ireland

# The Irish Harp

The Harp has long been a symbol of Ireland. Perhaps the legends of its magical powers come from the time when the

bards would sing and tell stories of famous events to the Irish kings and chiefs.

During the early 1500 s, under the rule of Henry VIII, the harp was first depicted on Irish coins. That tradition is carried on today. The harp is also used for other official duties such as the Irish State Seal, official documents and uniforms.

## The Flag of Ireland

The tricolor flag of Ireland was introduced by Thomas Francis Meagher



in 1848. The color of the green (nearest the flagpole) represents the Irish people, the orange (farthest from the flagpole) represents the English supporters of 'William of Orange\_ and the white color (center) represents peace.

Thomas Meagher, on the meaning of the Irish flag said, 'The white in the center signifies a lasting truce between the Orange and the Green; and I trust that beneath its folds the hands of the Irish Protestant and the Irish Catholic may be clasped in heroic brotherhood.






#### The Celtic Cross

The meaning of the Celtic Cross is told in legend of Ireland's St. Patrick. He was shown a sacred standing stone that was marked with a circle. St. Patrick took

this opportunity to show the union of old and new ways. He marked a cross through the circle and blessed the stone.

The Claddaugh Ring
The hands are here for
friendship,



The symbol of the Claddaugh Ring dates back to a fishing village in Galway known as Claddaugh village. It represents the fishing Kings of Claddaugh, whose motto was, 'in love and friendship let us reign. Later in the 17<sup>th</sup> century, the symbol was made into a ring that became a popular gift throughout Galway. Tradition says that the heart is worn outward to show the wearer is

'heart whole and fancy free. Many Claddaugh Rings have become family heirlooms and are a gift to be passed down from the mother and worn by a daughter on her wedding day.

#### The Shamrock

In ancient Ireland, the Shamrock was thought to have magical powers and the number

3 was considered a powerful number. Legends say the leaves will stand upright when a storm approaches and that no snake will be found among them. When St. Patrick came to Ireland, he used the Shamrock to symbolize the meaning of the Church's teaching on the Trinity.

The word shamrock comes from the old Irish word 'seamrog\_ which means 'summer plant.\_
