First Quarter:

BATTLE OF FREDERICKSBURG

In a clear, sunny morning, Gen. Meagher Division brothers gathered to honor the Irish Brigade's heroism and participated in the annual wreath laying ceremony at the Irish Brigade Memorial.

Frank O'Reilly gave a stirring presentation on the Irish immigrants in the five infantry NPS officer Frank O'Reilly gave a stirring presentation on the Irish immigrants in the five regiments that formed the Brigade: the 28th Massachusetts, 116th Pennsylvania, 63d, 69th and 88th New York.

Prior to the battle, General Meagher, standing before the colors of the 88th New York, announced: "Officers and soldiers of the 88th Regiment-In a few moments you will engage the enemy in a most terrible battle, which will probably decide the fate of this glorious, great and grand country-the home of your adoption!" Meagher paused for a moment, and in a stifled voice, continued: "Soldiers - This is my wife's own regiment, 'her own dear 88th,' she calls it, and I know, and have confidence, that with dear woman's smile upon you, and for

woman's sake, this day you will strike a deadly blow ... and bring back to this distracted country its former prestige and glory." The general raised his voice as he ended, "This may be my last speech to you, but I will be with you when the battle is the fiercest; and, if I fall, I can say I did my duty, and fell fighting in the most glorious of causes." Shells burst overhead, heightening the drama. The general climaxed his exhortation with a promise to the 116th Pennsylvania: "And boys I will lead you."_

Front-page news in Ireland President Obama's proposed reforms will allow thousands of Irish citizens to attend weddings and funerals in Ireland without fear of being barred from returning to their American lives. An estimated 50,000 Irish live here illegally.

Irish Foreign Minister Charlie Flanagan called Obama's executive order "real progress," to undocumented residents with at least five years stay and children in the United States. Irish diplomats will focus on persuading the Republican majority in Congress to support and extend Obama's orders to cover all Irish citizens with clean criminal records.

Irish nationalist leader in Northern Ireland, Alasdair McDonnell, said Obama's move would allow thousands of Irish citizens to visit relatives for the first time in many years. "This is a brave and visionary move by President Obamaŭ"

Galwayman Billy Lawless asked to introduce Obama in Chicago. Leading immigration advocate invited to speak before president second speech since he announced reform orders Senator Lindsey Graham said his party shared the blame for failing to get an immigration bill through the House of Representatives. Shame on us as Republicans for having a body that cannot generate a solution $\check{\mathbf{u}}$

BUT...

How many undocumented Irish will this help? Nobody really knows the exact number of undocumented Irish in the US. The Irish Government estimates that there are about 50,000 and Irish immigration activists expect the president s orders to benefit thousands.

Will it solve the long-running problem of people being unable to return to Ireland for important family occasions such as funerals? It will for those qualifying for legal status, but it is not clear yet how easy or flexible it will be for them to travel freely to and from Ireland. The devil will be in the detail and at present the small print needs further explaining.

Department of Homeland Security will clarify guidance to individuals with a pending lawful permanent resident application or certain temporary status permission to travel abroad with advance permission.

The Irish Pastoral Centre in Boston warned undocumented Irish immigrants not to travel back to Ireland for Christmas. Permission to travel outside the US on 'humanitarian parole_ is granted only after an application is filed to the authorities and approved. 'Leaving the US carries great risk if an individual does not consult an experienced immigration attorney, _

THE IRISH CHRISTMAS WREATH, by Mike McCormack (from the Wildgeese)



Christmas The modern wreath demonstrates the spirit of the season, but to some it is also a reminder of another spirit a spirit that demonstrated courage and fortitude dating back to 17th century Ireland, when the Penal Laws forbade the practice of the Catholic religion. Not only was their religion outlawed, but Irish clergy were on the run with a price on their heads. The Irish people kept the faith though, and secretly met their outlawed clergy to celebrate Mass in the woods, glens and mountains whenever they could.

Because of the oppression, Mass might be celebrated only once a month or even less, but one time they rarely missed was Christmas. In spite of the terrible times, Christmas still brought a sense of hope. A foreign power may have controlled the land, but they could not control the hearts of the Irish; they still had their customs, their faith, and their pride, and, by God, they would have their Mass. One example can be found in a glen south of Drogheda where stands a

Mass Rock which drew people who walked barefoot in a freezing stream so that they would not leave footprints in the snow to betray their destination. Christmas Mass was one custom they were not about to surrender.

Some of the other Christmas customs that were practiced, by the way, were older than the race that ruled them. Some had originated back at the dawn of time, in pre-Christian days, like the ringing of doors and windows with holly and ivy. That custom came from the ancient Celtic custom of ringing one's dwelling with those magical leaves. Since holly and ivy remained green when all other plants died, they were deemed immune to the killing force of winter and were therefore strung to form a protective barrier at all openings. Although the custom carried into the Christian era, its function was now purely decorative. Nevertheless, the British marveled at the hope that still burned in hearts they had tried so hard to subvert.

The source of that hope was their faith and in each community, courageous families would risk fine and imprisonment to attend a Mass in the dark of night, celebrated by one of the outlawed priests. On occasion an especially brave household would offer to host the celebration indoors away from the biting winter wind. Naturally, the house to be used was kept secret until just before the Mass was to begin, at which time a lighted candle was placed in the window to signal the faithful. Once the signal was given, candles were lit in every house window to confuse any who might try to interfere with the celebration. To the Irish, the meaning of the candle was clear, but to the stranger, it was merely an extension of the pagan custom of holiday decoration.

The candle, eventually became part of the custom, and remained long after its need as a signal disappeared. It also acquired new meanings, such as a light to guide the way for the holy family on their journey to Bethlehem (although such a need would indicate the family had gone astray more than a few miles on their journey). However, for those who know the original purpose of Christmas Candle. today s the Irish Christmas Wreath with a candle in the center is a reminder of the courage and the sacrifices made by our ancestors who placed a candle in a holly-encircled window to send out the message: The Lord is in this house tonight

THE TWELVE DAYS OF CHRISTMAS

What do leaping lords, French hens, swimming swans, and especially the partridge that won't come out of the pear tree have to do with Christmas?

Here is the explanation: From 1558 until 1829, Roman Catholics in England were not permitted to practice their faith openly. Someone during that era wrote this carol as a catechism song for young Catholics. The surface meaning symbolizes the hidden meaning known only to members of the Catholic Church in England for almost three centuries. Each element in the carol has a code word for a Christian reality which the children could remember.

- -The partridge in a pear tree was Jesus Christ.
- -Two turtle doves were the Old and New Testaments.
- -Three French hens stood for faith, hope and love.-
- -The four calling birds were the four gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke & John.
- -The five golden rings recalled the Torah or Law, the first five books of the Old Testament.
- -The six geese a-laying stood for the six days of creation.
- -Seven swans a-swimming represented the sevenfold gifts of the Holy Spirit--Prophesy, Serving, Teaching, Exhortation, Contribution, Leadership, and Mercy.
- -The eight maids a-milking were the eight beatitudes.
- -Nine ladies dancing were the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit--Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness, and Self Control.
- -The ten lords a-leaping were the Ten Commandments.
- -The eleven pipers piping stood for the eleven faithful disciples.
- -The twelve drummers drumming symbolized the twelve points of belief in the Apostles' Creed.

SIGNIFICANT DECEMBER DATES

December 1, 1494: Lord Deputy Sir Edward Poynings submitted what became known as Poyning's Law for vote. It subsequently passed and the Parliament of Ireland was placed under the authority of the Henry VII's Parliament of England. The law gave the English Parliament and monarch veto power over all Irish legislation. It was repealed 288 years later in1782. The overall points of the law were:

- 1. No Irish Parliament could convene until the King and the English Parliament were informed of the reasons for meeting. Any legislation or laws would have to be approved by both King and the English Parliament.
- 2. All previous English Parliament laws would also become law in Ireland
- 3. The Statute of Kilkenny was restored, except the ban on using the Irish language continued.
- 4. It was a felony to allow anti-government rebels on march in Ireland
- 5. Coign and livery (certain Gaelic customs) were outlawed
- 6. Irish war cries were now outlawed

December 6, 1679: Archbishop Oliver Plunkett was arrested in Dublin, found guilty of high treason "for promoting the Roman faith", and was condemned to death. The British Chief Justice said: 'You have done as much as you could to dishonor God in this case; for the bottom of your treason was your setting up your false religion, than which there is not anything more displeasing to God or more pernicious to mankind in the world_. The all Protestant jury returned with a guilty verdict and Archbishop Plunkett replied: 'Deo Gratias_. , Plunkett was hanged, drawn and quartered at Tyburn (the current location of Marble Arch in London). He was the last Catholic martyr to die in England. He was canonized in 1975; his feast day is July 11. (Read more about Saint Oliver Plunkett.pdf)

December 6, 1920: The **Anglo-Irish Treaty** (*An Conradh Angla-Éireannach*) concluded the *Irish War of Independence*, a guerrilla war fought from 1919 to 1921 between the Army of the Irish Republic and the British Government and its forces in Ireland. The agreement established the Irish Free State as a self-governing dominion within the British Commonwealth and provided an option for Northern Ireland to opt out of the Irish Free State which it did. The treaty was ratified by a narrow majority in Eamon de Valera's Dáil Éireann (*de facto* Irish Republic. In the world of unintended consequences, this split led to the Irish Civil War (June 1922-May 1923).

December 26, 1861: The U.S. Avoids War with Britain as President Lincoln and his cabinet decided to release imprisoned Confederate envoys James Mason and John Slidell in order to avoid the possibility of war with Britain, thus concluding the diplomatic uproar known as the **Trent Affair**. Mason and Slidell, en route to England to negotiate support for the Confederacy, were forcibly removed from the HMS Trent by Union Forces in early November. The Fenian

Brotherhood considered the tensions between the U.S and England as an opportunity to fight with the U.S. to free Ireland.

THE IRISH SPACE PROGRAM

The Irish played a substantial part in the "Rosetta" mission landing of a probe on the Churyumou Gerasiamenko asteroid. the first time, humans have a presence on a comet - cosmic objects that have both fascinated and terrified human beings since the dawn of history. And ... the engineer who landed the probe was Lawrence O'Rourke from Mullingar, O'Rourke is the European Space Agency's (ESA) Rosetta Science **Operations** Coordinator for the Lander (Philae) Operations Team. He is a Maynooth University physics and math graduate and has a Master's Degree in microelectronics from the University College Cork.

Space Technology Ireland Ltd. at Maynooth University designed, constructed and tested the Electrical Support System Processor Unit (ESS) for the Rosetta mission. ESS stores, transmits and provides decoding for the command streams passing from the spacecraft to the lander and handles the data streams coming back from the scientific experiments on the lander to the spacecraft. Ironically. November 19. documentary on the mission mentioned several European countries and engineers, not once mentioned the contribution or that it was an Irishman who landed the probe.
