News from the June 13th VAAOH State Board Meeting

The official AOH commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the 1916 Easter Rising will be held on Saturday, April 23 2016 in New York City. National Vice President Judge Jim McKay is chairman for the event. Displays of the 1916 Proclamation as seen at the 2014 National Convention will be available to support state commemorative activities. National Director Mike Delaney cited General T.F. Meagher and St Patrick Divisions as models for AOH recruiting; both divisions increased membership my 32% since 2011.

Deputy National Chaplain Father Timothy Harris, T.O.R. is being transferred to Austria. Father Tim served AOH in Virginia as Col. Cunningham Division chaplain and later as the VAAOH State Chaplain.

Be aware that people associate you with the AOH, so set a good example, especially at Mass and when wearing an AOH polo or green jacket.

Past President Committee (PPC) submitted for review and comment proposed amendments the current state by-laws; the proposed amendments were sent to all division presidents. Comments should be sent to VAAOH Executive Secretary Chuck Curran. The proposed amendments will be discussed at the first state meeting following the biennial convention. Also, the PPC will address the issue of Associate Members, specifically Irish-Catholic men who married outside the Church and therefore cannot be in compliance with religious duties as required in the AOH application.

The VAAOH 2014 Hibernian of the Year award was presented to Bill Baker, Father Corby Division. President Denault cited Brother Baker's numerous contributions to AOH at the division, county and state levels since joining the AOH in 2006. While serving as Father Corby Division president he re-invigorated the division, established numerous public events and brought focus to area charities.

Halfway Party: The Halfway to St Patrick Day celebration is on track: we have signed contracts for the **Seacobeck Hall** at UMW, the Irish band, **DragonFyre**, and the **Muggivan Irish Dance School** is committed to perform. Tickets and posters are printed. We need to begin ticket sales. **Harry Crisp** volunteered to lead publicity and ticket sales in St Mary Parish and the Fredericksburg area. We're soliciting brothers to act as "**Table Captains**" responsible for filling one or more tables. Harry will be contacting Brothers for this support. 

OUR HERITAGE



The famine proved to be a watershed in the demographic history of Ireland. As a direct consequence of the famine, Ireland's population of almost 8.4 million in 1844 had fallen to 6.6 million by 1851. The number of agricultural laborers and small land holders in the western and southwestern counties underwent an especially drastic decline. About one million people died from starvation or from typhus and other famine-related diseases. The number of Irish who emigrated during the famine may have reached two million. Ireland's population continued to decline in the following decades because of overseas emigration and lower birth rates. By the time Ireland achieved independence in 1921, its population was barely half of what it had been in the early 1840s.

SPEAKER JOHN BOEHNER'S IRISH FOURTH OF JULY 2015

Why Ireland? "The Taoiseach (or Prime Minister, Enda Kenny) comes to Washington every year on St. Patrick's Day," Boehner explained in his gallery, "So it was about time we visit Ireland for the Fourth," and trade stories with Kenny. My idea of a good Fourth of July is <u>cooking on the grill</u> for my family in West Chester, Ohio. This year, unfortunately, <u>our meetings in Europe</u> meant we'd spend the day away from home. That said, if you have to spend the Fourth of July outside the United States, you can't go wrong spending it in Ireland.

"After all, America wouldn't be America without the Irish."

This was also an opportunity to express in person Congress's <u>condolences on the deaths of six Irish</u> <u>students</u> who died last month in a tragic accident in Berkeley, California. The Irish people banded together—as they always do in times of tragedy—like family.



Enda has been Ireland's prime minister for about the same amount of time as I have been Speaker. We're both just regular guys with big jobs—and a lot of stories.

After lunch, we had a series of meetings with ministers and lawmakers. A big topic of discussion was trade. With passage of <u>trade promotion authority</u>, the United States has taken the next steps towards making trade agreements that help create more jobs and opportunities for America's workers. And closer ties between the United States and Europe mean less leverage for Russia and the world's aggressors. Dinner was also an opportunity to honor U.S.-Irish ties.

The *Irish Times* reported on July 3, "... Boehner told a Dublin audience of his determination to overcome Republican resistance to immigration reform," and mentioned that Kenny had pushed him on the issue, "telling him how the lack of reform has left some Irish immigrants listening to a parent's funeral by phone." (There are an estimated 50,000 Irish in this country illegally.)



The Fourth is a big day for our embassies, where they hold Independence Day celebrations around the world. This one brought nearly 3,000 people to our Ambassador's residence. On the Fourth, we ran into folks from at least 10 states, including a family from—where else?—Cincinnati, Ohio

We are blessed to have such courageous and determined allies as the Irish people. Before our country was even a country, Ben Franklin said Ireland would be "disposed to be friends of America." But with all we've weathered together—and all the work that lies ahead—we know that it's more than that. It's blood. It's family.

SOME JULY DATES OF INTEREST

July 1, 1867 – **Death of Thomas Francis Meagher**, Young Ireland leader, U.S. Civil War hero and Governor of Montana

July 4, 1921 - Awaiting truce with the English, Eamon De Valera orders the American flag flown in Dublin to "emphasize the principle for which we are fighting"

July 8, 1889 - In the last official bare knuckle title fight ever held, heavyweight boxer, John L. Sullivan beats fellow Irishman Jack Kilrain in a world championship bout which lasts 75 rounds

July 12, 1690 - Battle of the Boyne and victory for William of Orange

July 13, 1825 - The Catholic Association, dissolved in accordance with the Unlawful Societies Act

July 15, 1927 - Countess Constance de Markievicz, Irish patriot, dies. Also, it's revealed that all telephone, e-mail and fax messages between Ireland and Britain, and probably the United States, were tapped by the British Government

July 17, 1846 - Birth of Fenian, John McClure, one of 30 Fenian prisoners released in a conditional amnesty by the British government on January 5, 1871. John McClure, Jeremiah O'Donovan Rossa, John Devoy, Henry Mulleda and Charles Underwood O'Connell, shipped out

from Liverpool on board the "Cuba." The so-called 'Cuba Five' arrive in New York to a hero's welcome and even received a resolution of welcome from the US House of Representatives

July 21, 1920 - Catholics are forced out of Dromore, Co. Down

July 22, 2007 - Dubliner **Padraig Harrington** becomes the first Irish golfer to win the British Open in 60 years

July 29, 1848 – The **Young Ireland** uprising, Ballingarry, County Tipperary -- William Smith O'Brien, **Thomas Francis Meagher**, Terence Bellew McManus and Patrick O' Donohue are arrested, convicted of high treason, and sentenced to death. Sentences are commuted to transportation in June, 1849

July 31, 2007 - After 38 years, the **British Army occupation** of the north of Ireland **ends** at midnight. Operation Banner is the Army's longest continuous campaign in history with more than 300,000 personnel serving.



Irish Historian: Looking ahead to **September 15th**, Kevin Donleavy of Charlottesville is scheduled to speak. Kevin is author of *The Irish in Early Virginia 1600-1860*, a past Fellow at the Virginia Foundation for the Humanities, a retired Latin teacher, and he plays in an Irish band. His commitment to Irish cultural history spans forty years. He also has an Irish radio program heard on WTJU.net.
