IMPORTANT HERITAGE EVENTS IN DECEMBER

Division Christmas Party: 2PM, December 6th (St Nickolas Day), at St Michael the **Archangel High School**. We'll need volunteers (Pat Fogarty and Dan Butler already stepped up) for any number of tasks, including menu selection (pot luck for side dishes and desserts), food purchase, set-up and take-down of tables and chairs, decorations, <u>and</u> a Santa. The division budgeted \$500 for food and beverages (based on expenses for the summer picnic this will be more than enough). Any volunteers to stand-in for Santa? Wreath Presentation at Irish Brigade Memorial and Marye's Heights: For years (at least the past 16 years) our Division has paid tribute to Irish Brigade losses in the Battle of Fredericksburg. In coordination with the National Park Service and the 28th Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry Regiment (re-enactors), traditionally we present two wreaths one a the Irish Brigade Memorial at the Fredericksburg City Dock, where General Thomas F. Meagher led the brigade across the Rappahannock River, and a second wreath at Marye's Heights were the Brigade lost more than 40% of its men in a futile attempt to cross the 'Sunken Road_.

UPDATE: Irish Viet Nam Veterans Memorial Project (IVNVMP)

After almost a year of inactivity due in part to Matthew Carroll's illness, the project is back on You'll recall funding shortfalls placed the original memorial on hold. The Ennis town council in coordination with IVNVMP managers sought to restart the project with a more modest memorial. The town council is receiving new designs and appears to be favoring a new proposal: This Memorial is a curved single polished block of Irish Limestone about six feet high, set into a circle of limestone paving 12 feet in diameter. The names of the fallen and dedications will be inscribed into the limestone. Visitors will be able to trace over the names. Inset into the top of the memorial is a bronze panel. Seven sections give an illustrative and symbolic outline of Irish participation. When read from left to right the bronze panel has a depiction of the Brian Boru harp. The next five sections reflect the harsh economic climate in Ireland, the hard decision to leave Ireland, the Atlantic passage, and arrival in the USA. The final section is a depiction of the Statue of Liberty. I believe the project is within \$10,000 of the new monetary goal. (I'll have the artist's drawing for next month's *Dispatches*.)

CÚ CHULAINN




For Irish nationalists, Cú Chulainn is the most important Celtic Irish hero. This bronze sculpture of the dead Cú Chulainn by Oliver Sheppard stands in the Dublin General Post Office in commemoration of the Easter Rising of 1916. According to the best-known legends, he was tricked by his enemies into an unfair fight and slain at the age of 27. The sculpture depicts Cú Chulainn tied to a pillar, slumped in mortal agony, his head hung in defeat, the shield falling from his grasp, yet still, his sword is still clutched tightly in his right hand. A raven, with talons gripping the flesh is on his shoulder. The statue's image was used on the 1966 ten shilling coin produced for 50th anniversary of the Easter Rising. The Military Star for the Irish Defense Forces has the image of Cú Chulainn on the obverse.

(The **Military Star** is similar to the U.S. Military s Purple Heart; however, it is awarded posthumously to Irish Defense Force personnel 'killed or fatally wounded as a direct result of a hostile action $\check{\mathbf{u}}$ in the course of service on approved military duties overseas_.)

In our series on 1916 Easter Rising Irish patriots, this month feature:

Thomas J. Clarke

"We all believe we have saved the soul of Ireland. We have stuck the first successful blow for freedom. Freedom is coming, but between this and freedom, Ireland will go through hell. Ireland will never lie down again."



Tom Clarke was born on 11 May 1857. His is arguably the person most responsible for the 1916 Easter Rising. At the age of 20, he ioined Fenian/Irish Republican Brotherhood and by 1880 he was head of the local IRB circle. He was an ardent proponent armed revolution. In August 1881, during riots between the Orange Order and the Ancient Order of Hibernians (AOH) in Dungannon, Clarke and other IRB members attacked some Royal Irish Constabulary men. Clarke, fearing arrest, fled to the United States where he became active in the Fenian related Clan Na Gael. In 1883 he was sent to London, under the alias of "Henry Wilson", to blow up London Bridge as part of the Fenian dynamite campaign. He was arrested and sentenced to life in prison. When accusations of torture were verified, he was released after serving 15 years and returned to the USA.

In 1907 he returned to Ireland, opened a tobacconist shop in Dublin, and immersed himself in the IRB which was undergoing a substantial rejuvenation. Clarke maintained a low proEle in Ireland, but was influential behind the scenes in the years of preparation for the Rising.

The Irish Volunteers were formed in 1913. Clarke did not join the Volunteers; as a felon he believed his membership would discredit them. However, he convinced Padraig Pearse, the principle spokesman for the Volunteers, to become the critical liaison between the Volunteers and the IRB.

When the IRB Military Council was formed, in 1915, Clarke brokered an arrangement with James Connolly and the Irish Citizen Army. This completed the organization for the eventual rising.

Clarke announced the rising would be on Easter Sunday 1916. He was declared President and Commander-in-chief, but he refused any military rank or honors; these were given to Pearse, who was more well-known and respected on a national level. However, his was first signature on the Proclamation of Independence because of his seniority and commitment to the cause of Irish independence,

Clarke was stationed at headquarters in the General Post Office during the events of Easter Week, where rebel forces were largely composed of Irish Citizen Army commanded by Connolly. Though he held no formal military rank, Clarke was recognized by the garrison as one of the commanders, and was active throughout the week in the direction of the fight, sharing the fortunes of his comrades. He opposed the surrender, but was outvoted. Following the surrender on 29 April, Clarke was held in Kilmainham Jail until his execution by firing squad on 3 May at the age of 59. He was the second person to be executed, following Patrick Pearse.

Before execution, he asked his wife Kathleen to give this message to the Irish People: 'I and my fellow signatories believe we have struck the first successful blow for Irish freedom. The next blow, which we have no doubt Ireland will strike, will win through. In this belief, we die happy.'
