


One of the books on the AOH Summer Reading list is <u>All Standing</u> by Kathryn Miles. I hope this short piece generates interest the book!

<u>All Standing</u> is the story of the Jeanie Johnston, a "passenger ship" used to transport Irish emigrants escaping *An Gorta Mor*, and the related outbreak of cholera and other diseases. Transatlantic crossings were always unpredictable, so each trip was a dangerous undertaking. However, the Jeanie Johnston did not turn into one of the so-called coffin ships; during her many voyages nobody is known to have perished on board this ship.

Built in Canada in 1847, her maiden voyage was in April 1848 when she transported 193 Irish men, women and children from Kerry to Quebec. She also sailed to New

York and Baltimore. A one-way ticket cost £3.10, or about six months' wages for a typical Irish laborer. Her last voyage was in 1855; she sank while en route from Quebec back to Ireland (her crew was rescued).



During the 1990s many Irish and Irish-Americans contributed to a fund for the reconstruction of this Irish emigrant ship. In February 2003, the replica Jeanie Johnston emigrant famine ship, a floating museum, sailed from Kerry to the USA. She arrived at the Water Street Pier in Washington, DC on May 29th. Visiting the ship helped formulate a better understanding of the ordeal our 19<sup>th</sup> century forbearers experienced in the dank, dark hold an emigrant ship. I was one of the lucky few to board the ship in my role as VAAOH historian.

A Taste of Ireland: Irish Coffee, by Bridget Haggerty (edited for *Dispatches*)

Now a favorite after-dinner drink all over the world, many people are surprised to learn that it's a relatively recent invention.

The Irish Coffee story began at Foynes Airbase in Limerick in 1937. The airbase was the main airport for Flying Boats between America and Europe. By 1940, the airport was handling a large number of passengers, including VIPs such as Humphrey Bogart, Eleanor Roosevelt, Edward G Robinson, Ernest Hemmingway and Douglas Fairbanks Sr. Passengers remained in the airport while the flying boats were prepared for flight. Sometimes the wait could be overnight due to bad weather.

In 1941 Eamon DeValera visited Foynes and saw the need for a 1st class restaurant/lounge. He hired Brendan O'Regan to create a venue that would serve the best of Irish food and drink and present a positive image of Ireland and its people. By 1942, the new restaurant was up and running with Chef Joe Sheridan at the helm.

One winter night in 1942 a flight left Foynes for New York. After five grueling hours of battling a storm, they turned back. The restaurant was informed to prepare

food and drink as the passengers would be cold and miserable. Joe decided the passengers needed something special to warm them up. He brewed dark, rich coffee, splashed in some Irish whiskey and topped each cup off with freshly whipped cream. There was a hushed silence as the brew was tasted for the first time. A passenger asked "Is this Brazilian coffee?" "No," said Mr. Sheridan, "that's Irish Coffee."

Stanton Delaplane, an international travel writer, enjoyed it so much he brought the recipe back to Jack Koeppler, a bartender at the Buena Vista Hotel in San Francisco. They attempted to recreate it, but without success. The cool cream on top kept sinking. Koeppler returned to Ireland to learn the correct way to make it and that led to an interesting twist on this story.

After Shannon International Airport opened, Joe Sheridan took his famous drink to the new airport. But then, in 1952, Joe accepted a position at the Buena Vista in San Francisco where he continued to introduce his uniquely Irish creation. The rest, as they say, is more than 60 years of history.

## Sheridan's original recipe:

Cream - Rich as an Irish Brogue

Coffee - Strong as a Friendly Hand

Sugar - Sweet as the tongue of a Rogue (i.e. one spoon of brown sugar)

Whiskey - Smooth as the Wit of the Land.

**By The Way**: The word whiskey comes from the Irish "uisce beatha" which came from the Latin words, aqua vita - water of life. According to the history books, it's said to have been created around the 12th century, but there are many historians who believe it dates back much earlier. In any event, whiskey was widely distilled in Ireland by the 15th century, and during the **16th century**, it had earned a remarkable reputation, as evidenced by the following excerpt from a pamphlet called **"The Commodities of Aqua Vita".** It contains an ancient quote describing whiskey's magical properties:

"Being moderatlie taken, saith he, it sloweth age, it strengneth youth, it helpeth digestion, it cutteth flegme, it abandoneth melancholie, it relisheth the heart, it lighteneth the mind, it quickeneth the spirit...it keepeth and preserveth the head from whirling, the eies from dazeling, the toong from lisping, the mouth from maffling,

the teeth from chattering, and the throat from rattling; ...it keepeth the stomach from wambling, and the heart from swelling, the bellie from wirtching, the guts from rumbling, the hands from shivering and the sinews from shrinking, the veines from crumpling, the bones from aking, and the marrow from soaking."

- For **semi-formal/formal occasions**, the AOH "uniform" is green sport coat, tri-color sash, white shirt, Irish theme tie, black trousers and optional ball cap. These occasions include AOH State and National conventions, Masses, funerals, AOH dinners, parades, and other public events.
- At **informal events** (i.e. Division outings (ball games, picnics, meetings, etc.) the division logo polo or sweatshirts (optional ball cap) are appropriate.

**AOH Sash**: Brothers procure their own sashes. The AOH tri-color sash represents the national colors of Ireland and should be worn over the right shoulder (green closest to neck/collar) crossing to the left hip. Measure from right shoulder to left hip in inches; keep in mind the sash will normally be worn over a jacket, possibly a raincoat/overcoat (and maybe a growing waist line). Tri-color AOH sashes are available from:
