St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City

St. Patrick's Cathedral is one of New York City's finest buildings and most spectacular churches as well as being the largest house of worship for Catholics in the city. Over 160 years ago, Archbishop John Hughes announced plans to build the Cathedral. It took 21 years to build and was opened to the people in 1879.

Here are some facts about St. Patrick's Cathedral:

- ✓ The Cathedral was named after the patron saint of Ireland in response to the increasing numbers of Irish immigrants in the city.
- ✓ It is the largest Gothic Roman Catholic Cathedral in the United States.
- ✓ The cornerstone of the Cathedral was laid in 1858.
- ✓ The church takes up one whole city block. The spires rise 330 feet above street level. It seats 2,400 people.
- ✓ The new gallery organ, which was replaced in 1930, has 7,855 pipes.
- ✓ The Cathedral has 21 altars and 19 bells, each named after a different saint.
- ✓ It has more than 2,800 stained glass panels.
- ✓ Eight Archbishops of New York are buried in a crypt under the high altar.
- ✓ Five million people visit the Cathedral every year.
- ✓ More than one million prayer candles are lighted each year
- ✓ 15-18 Masses said every day
- ✓ 150 weddings every year.

The Rising of 1867

On the morning of March 5, 1867 thousands of men, some well-armed, others not, were to assemble in the Dublin Hills near the village of Tallaght. This was designated as the rendezvous point, the jumping off point, selected by Fenian General William Halpin. Unknown to all, the rendezvous location and the attack plan had been given to the English by a trusted Fenian courier turned English spy, John Corydon. The English military was prepared and the Rising failed. But these men lit the flame that burned until Easter 1916.

General Meagher Division Attire

Every brother should have these articles of clothing:

Semi-formal/formal occasions: The AOH "uniform" is green sport coat, tri-color sash, white shirt, Irish theme tie, black trousers and optional ball cap. These occasions include AOH Masses, funerals, dinners, parades, State and National conventions, and other public events.

Informal events (i.e. Division outings (ball games, picnics, meetings, etc.) the division logo polo or sweatshirts (optional ball cap) are appropriate.

Division Logo Items: Point of Contact for Division logo polo shirts, sweatshirts and ball caps is Shawn Lenahan (s_lenahan@verizon.net)

Green Jacket: Brothers procure their own green jackets. One source: http://blazerdepot.com/pages/mens_blazer/augustagreenblazer.html. Visit the website; call the 800 number; tell them you're with AOH and the \$5.00 small order fee can be waived. Kelly green is the color.

AOH Sash: Brothers procure their own sashes. The AOH tri-color sash represents the national colors of Ireland and should be worn over the right shoulder (green closest to neck/collar) crossing to the left hip. Measure from right shoulder to left hip in inches; keep in mind the sash will normally be worn over a jacket, possibly a raincoat/overcoat (and maybe a growing waistline).
