The Great Wagon Road

Writing on this topic resulted from email exchanges between Bob Fitzgerald and me. Bob's family dates from this period and region. In February 2021 the Free Lance Star published my article on Irish influences in U.S. history as a prelude to Irish American Heritage Month. I wrote about the origins of "Ulster Irish" and their reasons for immigration and how they founded a settlement named Donegal near Philadelphia. In furthering the "Ulster Irish" saga, Bob introduced me to the Great Wagon Road. I've knitted this piece together from several articles on the subject found on the Internet.

The Great Wagon Road became a primary route for the early settlers in the Southern United States, especially the Appalachian backcountry. Although a wide variety of settlers traveled southward on the road, two dominant cultures emerged: German and Irish. The Germans from the Rhine River valley found rich farmland in Pennsylvania and worked it to become stable and prosperous. They became known as the Pennsylvania Deutsch (corrupted to “Dutch”).

The Ulster Irish were more restless. These clannish immigrants moved further away from Philly and formed what became known as the Appalachian Culture. These Ulster Irish became the dominant culture of the Appalachians from Pennsylvania to Georgia, not only because of their numbers, but because of their independent spirit, adventurous personalities and restless nature. They became the frontiersmen.

The Great Wagon Road passed through southeastern Pennsylvania turning southwest across the Potomac River and into the Shenandoah Valley. From there they traveled along what became known as the Indian Road, an ancient Indian trail not well suited from wagon traffic. In 1744 these colonists were granted the right to settle along the Indian Road. In time the Great Wagon Road was improved and the Ulster Irish continued south through the Appalachian Valley from Pennsylvania to North Carolina, Tennessee and to Georgia.

As the Ulster Irish moved southward they brought their culture, art, and music with them. They brought the fiddle needed to play the music for Irish jigs and reels. (and today American bluegrass). Same thing with the smallest version of the accordion, the concertina also known as the "squeezebox". It too is used for traditional Irish dance tunes. And then there's clogging which developed from Irish step dancing called Sean-nós dance, an older style of traditional solo Irish dance.

Another bit of trivia is the origin of the term “Hill Billy”. As noted, Ulster Irish who settled in Appalachia brought traditional music with them and many of their songs referred to William of Orange. In the north of Ireland supporters of King William were often referred to as “Billy Boys” and in the North American Appalachian piedmont the nickname soon morphed into “hillbilly”.

New Files Reveal Secret British Battle to Defeat Irish America

Newly released files in Northern Ireland show the underground war the British waged to stop the Gerry Adams U.S. visa in 1994 and prevent appointment of a special U.S. envoy to the North. The documents make clear how hard they tried to prevent one from being appointed.

On June 30th, the Public Records Office of Northern Ireland released documents revealing the British thinking and actions in 1993 and 1994, the critical years when the IRA ceasefire, the Adams visa, the MacBride Principles and appointment of Mitchell as special envoy were all being hotly contested.

The files reveal a hardline colonial mindset to keep America out of the Irish issue at all costs. The battle against the Adams visa was presented in almost apocalyptic terms as similar to the split between the US and Britain on the Suez Canal issue in 1956. The British seemed completely unaware of how shaky their “special relationship” with the US had become under President Bill Clinton.

Adams was described as “Goebbels” by a clearly overwrought ambassador who had been outfoxed by the Irish lobby. The British realized too late that the special relationship would not stop a determined President Bill Clinton. The fact that Nancy Soderberg was deputy national security advisor on his staff was highly significant. She had handled the Irish issue for Senator Ted Kennedy and knew it inside out. She kept Clinton involved. Other players were former Congressman Bruce Morrison (D-CT), business leaders Bill Flynn, Tom Moran, Irish American Labor Coalition leader Joe Jamison and philanthropist Chuck Feeney.

The British argued that allowing Adams into America would be seen as talking to terrorists. The reality was that the British were secretly talking to the IRA at the time, a fact that never seems to bother them in their duplicity.

The documents show they depended on then U.S. Ambassador to the U.K. Raymond Seitz, who carried no weight in the Clinton White House where he was considered to have gone native. Seitz swore that Adams would never make it to the U.S. Similar to Seitz, U.S. Consul General in Belfast Val Martinez was in lockstep with the British. The groupthink between the British Embassy and the U.S. State Department is striking.

The British sought to block the appointment of a U.S. envoy on the

grounds that doing so would allow an outside country to have influence in the North and would upset the delicate balance in the meandering talks that were taking place. They came up with two strategies, one more ridiculous than the other.

House Speaker Tom Foley, the biggest Anglophile in Congress, put forward a scheme where he would be the envoy. He would visit Ireland north and south and report back that all looked well. The Irish government politely declined that notion. The Irish diplomatic corps in Washington, men like Brendan Scannell and Ambassador Sean O Huiginn, were a step ahead of their British counterparts.

The second British plan included Frank Costello, a well-known Irish activist, press secretary to Boston Mayor Ray Flynn and later a senior staffer with Congressman Joe Kennedy. He kept the British apprised about what was going on, especially in relation to the MacBride Principles and a special envoy.

Costello also proposed to himself to be the envoy, attached to the U.S. Consulate in Belfast where he would work on economic development. Costello was a disruptive character in Irish America at the time and a frequent visitor at the British Consulate in Boston. The memos show he was sending Joe Kennedy's planned

statements and resolutions on a special envoy to the British ahead of time.

Irish-born Leonard Doyle, the New York correspondent for the London Independent, was supplying information from New York and was keeping an eye on engaged Irish-Americans for his British friends.

In the end, despite the spying and lying Adams got his visa, Mitchell became the envoy and the IRA ceasefire happened followed by the Good Friday Agreement. The British had badly underestimated the Irish American lobby and they paid the price. ♦

AOH Sash: Brothers procure their own sashes. The AOH tri-color sash represents the national colors of Ireland and should be worn over the right shoulder (green closest to neck/collar) crossing to the left hip. Measure from right shoulder to left hip in inches; keep in mind the sash will normally be worn over a jacket, possibly a raincoat/overcoat (and maybe a growing waistline).
