Little Known Irish Inventions/Inventors!

Sean O'Reilly: Quick Tattoos

The first patent for a tattoo machine was filed by Irish immigrant Sean O'Reilly, in New York in 1891. O'Reilly was an established tattoo artist and did the artwork adorning some of the most wellknown carnival ladies including Emma De Burgh and Annie Howard. Tattooed ladies were big business providing a popular freakshow attraction.

He gained recognition for faster and cleaner work thanks to his electronic machine. O'Reilly died in 1908 and his apprentice Charlie Wagner continued to work until his death in 1953.

Samuel Haughton: Humane Hanging

Samuel Haughton, a doctor and ordained priest, was born in Carlow and worked as a professor of geology at Trinity College. In 1896, he devised the precise mathematical equation that enabled hanging to be used as a humane method of execution. He found that by using the correct length of rope you could almost ensure the human neck would snap, causing paralysis and unconsciousness. This would avoid the grim spectacle of watching the convict strangling to death. It's a system that became known as the *standard drop*, most famous executing condemned Nazis after the Nuremberg Trials.

James Martin: The Ejection Seat

James Martin was born in Crossgar, Co. Down. In 1934, Martin together with Valentine Baker formed an aircraft-engineering firm. During the testing Baker was killed when the plane's engine seized and he crashed. After witnessing his friend's death, Martin was fixated on safety, especially a means to assist a pilot's escape. He tinkered with the idea of a forced ejection seat with its occupant still seated by an explosive charge located under the seat. Naturally, a parachute was also required.

Robert Boyle: Chemistry

It's widely accepted in scientific circles that Boyle was the creator of chemistry. Boyle was born in 1627 in Waterford. He was educated at Eton and eventually settled in Dorset where he built a

laboratory. He was the first to perform controlled experiments before documenting and publishing his procedures and findings. His most famous discovery "Boyle's Law" held that if the volume of a gas is decreased the pressure will increase As well as this, he introduced the litmus test to tell acids from bases and many other standard chemical tests still used today.

Robert Mallet: Seismograph

Dubliner Robert Mallet's was born in Dublin in 1810, the son of a factory owner. He studied at Trinity College, graduating with degrees in science and mathematics and joined his father's iron foundry works. The firm was one of the most important engineering businesses in Ireland. They supplied iron for the railways, the swing bridge over the River Shannon at Athlone and the famous railings that surround Trinity College.

At the age of 22, he presented a paper titled <u>On the Dynamics of Earthquakes</u> at Royal Irish Academy. The paper included the first recorded use of the words *seismology* and *epicenter*. Through controlled experiments on a Wicklow beach, he set off underground explosions to prove that energy moved through sand and rocks in waves. From this he created a series of seismic readings.

These readings are what today's seismologists use to predict the destructive power of earthquakes and arrange emergency evacuations.

Ernest Walton: Splitting the Atom

Walton was born in Co. Waterford in 1903, the son of a Methodist minister. He was sent to boarding school in Belfast and later won a scholarship to Dublin's Trinity College where he earned a bachelor's and master's degrees.

Following graduation he was awarded a research fellowship at Cambridge. He met John Cockcroft and they collaborated on experiments with a goal of understanding and altering the atomic structure. It was this research that resulted in what is commonly known as the "splitting of the atom". Their discovery won them the Nobel Prize in Physics in 1951.

Boycotts

Boycotts, the withdrawal of commercial support as a form of protest, is the result of one man's misguided feud with the Irish Land League in Irish land wars of 1800s. The Irish Land League hoped to abolish the status quo of land ownership by rich British lords who extorted money from Irish tenant farmers.

Captain Charles Boycott was in charge of collecting rent from tenant farmers near the Lough Mask, Co. Mayo. The farmers demanded a reduction in rent and when many refused to pay, Boycott evicted them. The Irish Land League encouraged farmers to unite and refuse to co-operate. Soon Boycott was left with acres of land without the workforce. The Irish Land League succeeded in turning Boycott's name into shorthand for their new form of protest.

Hans Sloane: Chocolate Milk

Sloane was born in a thatched house on Frederick Street in Killyleagh, Co, Down, close to Killyleagh Castle. At the age of 19 he moved to London to study medicine. A successful physician,

he counted the Royal Family among his patients and grew himself a pretty substantial fortune. He became president of the Royal College of Physicians, succeeding Isaac Newton. His collection of books and manuscripts became the basis of The British Library.

It was during a trip to Jamaica when the locals introduced him to a local delicacy known as cocoa. Sloane found that by mixing it with milk, it became a more enjoyable drink. He brought the recipe home to London with him where it was sold in apothecaries as a medicine. Eventually a certain Mr. Cadbury noticed the recipe, and the rest is history — delicious, delicious history.
